As a caller (albeit one new to the scene) I have been aware of Hiltons since I first took up the mic. Hilton is a brand of Public Address amplifier that has been specifically designed with the needs of Square Dance calling in mind. Classic Hiltons combine a record player

with microphone inputs along with the essential music volume control knob on the microphone handset, the Hilton then combines these inputs and sends the music and callers voice to a loudspeaker. In the classic days of Square Dance, the Hilton was an essential piece of every caller's equipment.

When I first started my calling journey I obtained, for fairly cheap (£100), a Hilton 201 showing some wear and tear (for example the knob for controlling music volume on the microphone handset never worked properly), which seemed to be a reasonable thing to get started.

With use and time, the Hilton 201 more noticeably started suffering intermittent problems.

I considered what to do. It looked tatty with its turntable foam showing signs of degradation and it was clearly developing mechanical/ electronic faults.

The last straw was during a dance, when I found that the inputs for both music and microphone were "loose" and that either or both inputs would cut out intermittently. We ended up bending cables and taping them to the table so they would put tension on the sockets that kept them functional. My calling buddy declared that it was "a useless piece of equipment" (he used different words) that "deserved to be thrown away".

However, as an engineer, I did not want to give up on what was once a fine piece of engineering and electronics. I asked around seeking someone who could, within my budget, bring it back to a fit state.

I finally found John Mee, who agreed to take a look to assess what he thought needed work and to provide an estimate of cost and duration to repair. I thought his estimate and professional approach was agreeable and asked him to repair/ maintain my Hilton as he saw best. John provided a very clear and precise description of what he had done and I was very happy to pay for his efforts.

On the day of my Hilton's return, I was attending a dance, where a key piece of equipment was forgotten by one of the callers and so my refurbished Hilton got put to use straight away. It not only performed perfectly, but looked the part of a professional piece of callers equipment. My calling buddy (see above) was very complimentary of this "excellent piece of equipment" and was amazed at the transformation that had been wrought.

The reason for this article is to flag up that the Hiltons are great pieces of equipment, but are getting old. Many components are well past their design life, are failing or otherwise need replacing. Some clubs and users are losing confidence in their Hiltons. I also strongly suspect that there may be some Hiltons collecting dust in the cupboard due to a club closing or regular guest callers using different equipment. But before abandoning these iconic pieces of equipment, we really should consider giving them the expert maintenance that they deserve.

My calling buddy (OK I'll name and shame) Alan and I so far think the refurbished Hilton is better than ever. If your old Hilton is showing signs of degradation or even if it has just been sat gathering dust, you might want to consider refurbishment/ repair. Though there may be other people around the country with the relevant expertise, I can personally recommend John Mee. I thought his cost was reasonable and John showed me all the replaced components and explained why he replaced each. He also PAT tested the Hilton and provided a certificate. (Just to give you a ballpark cost estimate, I paid around £85 to have my Hilton transformed, though costs will vary depending on model and what needs doing.)

Rhythm School RS 728 (Original Artist: Bobby Rydell)

An English version of the song: "Nel blu, dipinto di blu", with music composed by Italian singer-songwriter Domenico Modugno who (along with Franco Migliacci) wrote the lyrics in Italian (the English lyrics were written by Mitchell Parish). It was released as a single in 1958 and was covered by several artists. Dean Martin (who sang it with both English and Italian lyrics) had the most success - Rhythm music, with Greg Moore on the vocal!

Mainstream Choreography: Heads Promenade Halfway, Square Thru Four Swing Thru, Boys Run, Ferris Wheel, Square Thru Three, Swing.

Crazy Train ~ Leo Catt

SharpShooter SS 1090 (Original Artist: Ozzy Osbourne)

Ozzy was one of my favourite artists when I was younger; I have always been a big fan of Heavy Metal - although I seriously doubted that it would be possible to create a good Square Dance from this style of music. Here is the exception that proves the rule! I am not sure how popular this track will become - but SharpShooter have created a fantastic version of this song; Heavy Metal Guitar, a Square Dance beat - and a first class vocal!

Mainstream: Square Thru, Right and Left Thru, Veer Left, Couples Circulate Chain Down the Line, Pass the Ocean, All Eight Circulate, Swing.

Looking for Love ∼ *Kip Garvey*

Eureka EUR 1025 (Original Artist: Johnny Lee)

A song written by Wanda Mallette, Bob Morrison and Patti Ryan and released in 1980 as part of the soundtrack to the film: "Urban Cowboy"; the recording achieved No.1 on the Billboard Hot Country Singles Chart and was certified "Gold" for shipments of 1,000,000 units by the Recording Industry Association of America. Eureka have done an excellent job with both the music - and a first-class vocal, from top Music Producer Kip Garvey!

Mainstream Choreography: Heads Square Thru, Swing Thru, Boys Run Tag the Line, Cloverleaf, Girls Square Thru Three, Swing and Promenade.

We're All Alone ~ Chris Froggatt

Knee-Deep KDM 179 (Original Artist: Rita Coolidge)

Written by Boz Scaggs from his 1976 album "Silk Degrees" and put out a single in 1977. However, this song became a hit for Frankie Valli in 1976 and was also a "top-ten" hit in 1977 for Rita Coolidge in the US and the UK, when it was released as a single, from her album "Anywhere"; her version had the greatest sales success. Knee Deep use the Big Band Style music, as played in the original song; Chris does a great job on the Vocal!

Promenade Half, Lead Right, Right & Left Thru, Veer Left, Couples Circulate Chain Down the Line, Pass the Ocean, Boys Circulate, Girls Trade, Swing.

MIA Down in MIA ~ Tom Miller

ESP ESP 370 (Original Artist: George Strait)

Released as a single by George Strait in May 2024, this track will be part of the list for his 2024 album "Cowboys and Dreamers", due for release on 6th September; the song was written by Adam Craig and Dean Dillon. In case you are not sure what the title of this song actually means it refers to the term Missing In Action and to an abbreviation for Miami. Excellent music from ESP, with Tom Miller doing a great job on the Vocal!

Mainstream Choreography: Heads Square Thru Four Hands, Swing Thru Boys Run, Bend the Line, Right and Left Thru, Pass the Ocean, Recycle.

Old Days ~ Dean Singleton

Arrowhead ARROW 1167 (Original Artists: Chicago)

A song written by James Pankow for Chicago, released on their album "Chicago VIII" in 1975, with lead vocals by Peter Cetera; it was the second single to be released from that album. James Pankow was quoted as saying that the song uses "key phrases that, although they date me, are pretty right-on in terms of images of my childhood"; a great piece of music from Arrowhead, with another outstandingly good vocal from Dean!

Callers Corner - Flow Modules: what they are - and why they are important!

Jerry story was the first person that I heard use the term: "Flow Module". He began to talk about them during the period when he was trying to put into words the system of Calling that he personally used to control the Dancers and resolve the Squares; this was the subject that most of the Student Callers he had been asked to coach, wanted him to explain. He published a full explanation of the methodology that he used to use when he was Calling (now extremely well known as CRaMS) and references to: "Relationship Calling, when you are using Flow Modules", was a major part of this explanation.

A Flow Module is a series of Calls that fit together really well - and give the Dancers a smooth, purposeful dancing experience. It is not so much a question of the individual Calls that are used - but the way that they fit together as part of the overall traffic pattern of the sequence - and the choreographic objective that they achieve. A really good Flow Module will use a combination of Calls that are unique (and perhaps unusual) to create an interesting choreographic effect, that achieves a specific purpose.

To create this type of choreography - so that it can be used in an effective, successful manner - Callers need a very good understanding of the ideas behind three essential CALLERLAB Curriculum subjects: "Body Flow", "Timing", and "Degree of Difficulty"

Body Flow (includes the following ideas):

- Direction of Turn (if any) which way are the Dancers turning at the completion of the Call (some Calls do not present a Direction of Turn)?
- Hand Availability which Hand (or Hands) are free at the completion of the Call and which hands need to be free at the start of the Call, in order to Dance it?
- Counter Dancing what effect does the Call have (if any) on people to whom the Call is not directed?
- Which Calls provide a form of assistance to help Dancers complete them correctly?

Timing (includes the following ideas):

- A correct understanding of: Command Time, Reaction Time and Execution Time

Degree of Difficulty (includes the following ideas):

- A correct understanding of: the inherent complexity that exists in certain Call uses and some Call combinations; which are the easiest/ most difficult to Dance?

Callers need to carry out a considerable amount of research - to answer these questions correctly and effectively, the required research is best indicated on the CALLERLAB "Call Analysis Sheet" (as I mentioned last month); this research must consider both Standard as well as Extended applications. If you take the time to create as many "Flow Module" ideas as possible, you will eventually build up a formidable repertoire of Calls that could be used for Dancer Success at any point during an extemporaneous Calling operation; thus it is the absolute best way to develop modules associated with microprogramming.

A Point of Clarification - from Paul Bristow

I have not "quit Calling" (apparently there is a rumour that I have). I still Call regularly for my clubs, which adds up to more than one hundred nights a year - and I am happy to Call at any events - Saturday or Weekend (or longer) anywhere in the World, if I can.

I think that the confusion may have arisen because - as things stand - I have no more bookings in the UK this year, except for those events that I have put on myself; in fact, my next UK booking to Call a Saturday dance for another Club, is in April 2026! (the one exception is the "North West and Lakes Weekend" in October; an annual festival) I have never refused to take a booking, if I could - so it would be more accurate to say that the groups who used to book me are the ones that have "quit calling" (me)!

However, this does not worry me too much; the fact is I am not "crying out" for work! I have been Square Dancing for 50 years and Calling for 48 years - and it may be that my time "in the spotlight" has come to an end. Maybe, I have had my "fifteen minutes of fame" (as Andy Warhol predicted) and perhaps the Carbon-Arc lamps (the footlights on the stage, referred to as the "Limelight") that light the stage, have (as happens with the flame of a match that burns brightly until it fades away) come to an end and "gone out..." But if that is the case all I can say is: "thank you" to all of the Dancers, Clubs and other organisations that have supported me over the years it's been great fun!

So where did this rumour about me deciding to "quit Calling" come from?

It is true to say that - for some time - I have found it more difficult to travel in the UK. Many years ago - due to various medical problems, I had to stop driving long distances - and my wife, Hazel took over the task of driving me to the places where I had been booked to Call. Unfortunately, due to Hazel's mobility problems (partially due to her having been "knocked down" crossing the road a while back), she finds it too difficult to continue doing all the driving for me, which has given me a major problem. I did try to drive longer distances on two recent events but realised that it would be unsafe to do this on a regular basis; I even had to stand down from being a Club Caller at Tilehurst!

I am pleased to say that there have been many offers of help from my friends, who are happy to transport me over long distances, for longer events which is a practical option for weekends etc.. On occasion, when it is just me that has to get there, I have made use of the National Express coaches to transfer me. However, it should be noted that is not possible to take my Square Dance sound equipment by this method so, when I take the bus, groups have to find someone from whom they can "borrow" equipment for me to use (usually from the Club Caller); although, not all Callers are happy with this idea.

So why am I writing this? Recently, (as many of you will be aware) Johnny Preston following a fall - was unable to attend the Symonds Yat week and a replacement Caller had to be found. 
